One of the principles I use when decided to work with the non-public sector is working with the providers that are the most used by the people. Find out why people use those providers, find out how to improve their services and find out what can be done to expand their reach. The biggest concern in applying this principle is whether you should engage providers whose quality cannot be ensured. This is especially the case in Africa with traditional providers who are often very popular with rural consumers, but whose quality is difficult to judge, let alone ensure. At what level of quality should public policy be to engage and improve and below what level should policy be to control or discourage?
