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
What do we mean by the private sector?

Definition: Any entity in which the owners, managers and employees are not public sector workers.

- Individual private practitioners: doctors, midwives, chemists, pharmacist traditional practitioners
- Labs, Hospitals & clinics (for profit and non-profit)
- Pharmaceutical Manufacturers

Common Myths


The private sector is a trivial player in health care provision and financing


Percent Expenditure on Health (Chart Two)

Why do so many use the private sector?

Convenience

- Perceived to be higher quality
- Public Sector services are NOT free they cost in lost time, transport, medicines and under-thetable payments





Mysteries: What do we need to know

- Careful evaluation of the various approaches to building successful public-private partnerships
- Better understand of how government norm setting and regulatory role can be strengthened to provide oversight of private provision of health products and services

Conclusion

- Working exclusively with the public sector hasn't solved the problem of lack of access to essential health services, particularly for the poor
- The private sector is already reaching this client base and offers an avenue for improving access and equity, within an appropriate policy and regulatory environment
