

• TFR: 5.5; Modern CPR: 9.8%


Unmet need

 limiting



Private sector a major source for FP, especially short-acting methods



Private sector challenges and opportunities

- FP client volume still relatively low
- About 40% of facilities in Lagos want to offer new methods – implants and IUDs
- Need to:
 - Increase method choice
 - Generate demand
 - Improve commodity supply
 - Provide business training to enhance viability





Improving private sector supply

Supply:

- Family planning training (counseling and clinical skills for LARC)
- Linkages to commodities
- Supportive supervision
- Improving business viability
 - Business training
 - DCA





Generating private sector demand

Demand:

- Community health promoters (info and referral)
- Clinic health days
- Integration opportunity with primary care services






RCT demonstrates positive outcomes

- 8.5% increase in the quality of FP counseling
- 15.3 percentage point increase in the proportion of facilities keeping the Federal MoH FP register up to date
- 5 percentage point increase in the proportion of facilities that applied for and obtained a loan in the last 24 months



Results: increased method choice





Lessons to increasing method choice in the private sector

- FP training, business trainings, and quality and supportive supervision can help private providers to effectively expand method choice.
- Community level demand generation is important to increase local knowledge of FP service from private providers.
- Not all trained providers have the appropriate client flow to be effective providers of LARCs.
